



THE HOUSE & GARDEN

Bringing together six architectural periods, Arundells is one of the finest houses in Salisbury's Cathedral Close. Parts of the house date back to the 13th Century, when it served as a canonry. Much of the external appearance is due to John Wyndham, who lived here between 1718 and 1750. Wyndham's daughter married the sixth Lord Arundel of Wardour, a Catholic, and Jesuit priests were often accommodated in the attic. During the 1800s, Arundells housed the Godolphin Girls' School and then a boys' boarding school. Having fallen into a bad state of repair, the house was considered for demolition in the mid-1900s but was restored by Robert and Kate Hawkings, who took on the lease in 1964. Further refurbishment was undertaken by Sir Edward Heath, who came to Arundells in 1985. When Sir Edward died in 2005, his wish was that the public should be able to enjoy the beautiful house and garden and his remarkable collection of art and memorabilia.



SIR EDWARD HEATH KG MBE

Sir Edward Heath was Prime Minister from 1970 to 1974 and served as an MP for over 50 years. He was a talented musician, conducting many of the world's leading orchestras. He was also an accomplished sailor, winning major international ocean racing trophies aboard his Morning Cloud yachts.



THE COLLECTION

Arundells is presented today as it was when Sir Edward lived here and reflects both his public life and personal interests. Gifts from leaders as diverse as Winston Churchill, Richard Nixon, Chairman Mao and Fidel Castro sit alongside beautiful collections of ceramics, glassware and sculpture. An extensive art collection includes works by: Winston Churchill, William Wyllie, L S Lowry, John Singer-Sargent, John Nash, John Piper, Walter Sickert, Augustus John and Gwen John. Other highlights



include a cartoon gallery, model ships made by Napoleonic prisoners of war, Sir Edward's sailing trophies and musical memorabilia. From the Far East, the house features hand painted Chinese wallpaper (pictured right), as well as a stunning collection of Japanese woodcuts.
